## **Camp Whitman**

Camp Whitman has over 117 acres on the west side of Seneca Lake. Campers live in small cabins clustered in family groups around fire rings, and eat together in a large dining hall. Bathroom facilities include the main shower house with flush toilets, and outhouses throughout the camp. Many opportunities for exploring abound in the woods, ravines, meadows, Punnett's Pond, and lakefront. Organized recreation takes place on the playing field, in canoes and sailboats at the lakefront, and at the pool for the supervised swimming. Visit their website to signup for camp. #### Frequently asked questions:

How many campers attend Camp Whitman? We have 85-90 campers on site at one time. This includes 24 campers in our camp for youth and adults with developmental disabilities.

What are the ages of the campers? Our campers range in age from 8 to 18 years old. Our campers with developmental disabilities range in age from 11 to 70 years old.

What should campers bring with them to Camp Whitman? Campers should pack clothing that is comfortable and suitable to the activity in which they will be participating.

Clothing: Underwear (for at least 5 days), Socks (many pairs – they get wet!), Pajamas, Shirts, T-shirts, etc., Shorts (several pairs), Long pants (several pairs), Heavy sweater (1), Sweat shirts, Sweat pants, Warm jacket, Raincoat / Poncho, Sneakers (extra pair), Hard soled shoes (closed toe / sturdy construction e.g. Hiking boots), Swimming Suit (2), "Flip-flops" (for shower or pool), Extra pair of old sneakers / water shoes (for lake use), Sandals (optional), A white article of clothing (e.g. T-shirt) or a piece of white cloth for Tie-Dying.

Other Essentials: Soap & Soap dish, Toothbrush / Toothpaste, Deodorant (non-aerosol), Comb / Brush Plastic cup, Chapstick, Sunscreen, Writing material (stamps), Insect repellent (non-aerosol), Hat, Laundry bag, Flashlight with extra batteries, Backpack or book bag to carry articles to shower house, All medications must be given to the camp nurse and cannot be left with the camper., sleeping bag or blankets for bed roll, pillow, extra blanket (for cool nights), towels including a beach towel and washcloths.

**Optional Articles** (depending upon campers interests and specific needs):, Pencil, paper, envelopes & stamps, Book (for possible quiet times), Musical instruments, Camera, Film, Boots, Bicycle / safety helmet

What campers should not bring to Camp Whitman: Any aerosol cans — bad for our environment, Radios, ipods, electronic games, etc., Cell or smart phones, Pocket knives (of any kind), Money (there is no camp store) There are T-shirts, sweatshirts, vests and postcards to buy at registration, but afterwards there is no other reason or opportunity to buy anything., Snack food, candy, pop, gum, cough drops (animals can sniff these out and enter your cabin for a treat!)

#### **News From The Presbytery**

#### **Church World Services and Ecumenical Advocacy Days Experience**

I have just returned from a CCT (CCT = Churchwide Coordinating Team of PW) sponsored combination Mission and Justice-Peace trip. This trip took me to the Brethren Center in New Windsor, Maryland which houses the warehouse for Church World Services, IMA World Health, and SERRV. And then we were off to the Ecumenical Advocacy Days in Arlington, Virginia.

Seven of us worked in the Church World Services warehouse for two days. We processed 2000 health kits. We ask that when preparing kits, please only put into the kits the items on the list. There were so many well meaning items contributed to the kits that had to be removed. Some of the items on the NO-NO list were dental floss, tooth paste, Bible verses, notes, shampoo, conditioner, used and soiled towels. I cannot say enough – ONLY follow the list instructions.

The cost of the room and board for this volunteer experience is quite nominal. It took me 5 1/2 hours drive. One of the women that attended drove from Alabama and picked up health kits from her Synod (Living Waters) along the way. Her van was full of nearly 1000 kits. When she opened her van for us to unpack, the smell of bar soap was overwhelming.

Then it was off to Ecumenical Advocacy Days. We were joined by 750 other Christians, half were Presbyterian. The theme was "At God's Table: Food Justice for a Healthy World." We were seeking the abundance and equality of food and of inviting and feeding even the poorest in our midst and where the poorest were given a special place at the table. The event culminated with Lobby Day on Capitol Hill where Congress was urged to support a multi-year reauthorization of the Farm Bill.

It is being talked about CCT hosting this duo mission & justice/peace event again next year. Also, individuals and groups are welcome at the Brethren Center anytime to volunteer. I urge you to take this short road trip for this mission experience.

In addition, it was clear that feeding the hungry is always a challenge. And the global issues – wow! I did not realize that there were countries that are fighting the mining industry to keep their farm land!

It was great meeting up with so many Presbyterians from across the miles; reconnecting with old friends and making new ones along the way.







With the demands of retired people, and the demands of family, grandchildren, jobs and work schedules, our bell choir ringers have very, very busy lives. Keeping these demands in mind I had scheduled a performance on May 19 and also on June 2. There were 9 people available for May and 7 for June. The number of ringers available precludes the number of octaves we can use. For 7 people we can use two octaves and for

9 we can use 3 octaves of bells. Fortunately over the years we have built our files to include music for 2-3-4-5 octaves of bells and/or chimes and all levels of difficulty. There are many choices with some of the music being familiar, and some that were performed many years ago.

My goal for July and August is to work with the ringers who are available and would like to perform in bell ensembles. The ensembles can be duets, trios, quartets, quintets and sextets. We have, again over the years, built files for all types of ensembles. Ensemble ringing is a little more complex than performing as a bell choir in that each person is responsible for more than 2 bells. It is a bit challenging but the real enjoyment comes from actually being able to learn something new and fun! I also hope that we will be able to have the summer camp children perform on bells.


My goal for September is to perform with 13 or 14 ringers and use all 5 octaves of bells and chimes. This will require the bell choir to find a Sunday that is free for all of us and that the Wednesday rehearsals are well attended. Music for this is quite challenging and will need at least 5 rehearsal dates. I'm hoping that sometime in either October or early November this will be possible. We have a very fine bell choir and a beautiful 5-octave set of bells and chimes and the music written for 5 octaves is really musically beautiful.

I would like to ask the congregation for someone who has an interest in learning to play bells please consider joining us. We will teach you all you need to know and will help you as you are learning. I really need one more person so please consider taking the chance to be bell ringer. All you need is the interest in bells and we will take it from there.
