Session Briefs



There are many opportunities to help the House of Concern that do not entail giving of food or money, but rather of your **time**. Because we are a nonprofit helping those in need, we rely heavily on volunteer labor. Every part of our organization can use more volunteers at present, as follows:

Sorting Room: Monday is an extremely busy day in the sorting room, since many donations are brought in over the weekend. If you have time to sort through and price clothing and household goods, let us know.

Food Pantry: Help is needed to sort through and shelve food donations and to fill baskets for clients. Every Tuesday and Thursday a truck delivers food from Food Link and we need extra hands to help put it away.

Office: Our Executive Director can use help with sorting, organizing and filing in the office.

Our mission is to increase public awareness and local officials' understanding of safety and environmental risk factors for all area residents, as well as harmful economic impacts to the wine and tourism industry, that would result from the establishment of a massive liquid petroleum gas storage facility on Seneca Lake. "


