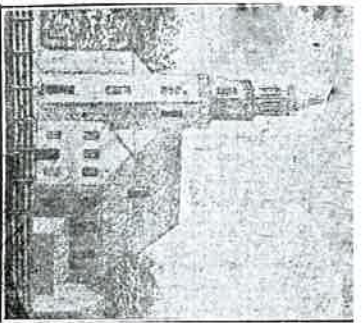


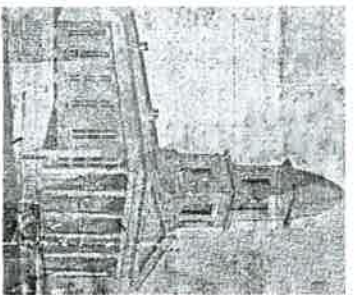
Time Line of Important Events of The First Presbyterian Church of Seneca Falls



Col. Daniel Sayre Barn
located on Lake Rd 1807

at current location 1817



"Second" Church
at current location 1842



"Third" Church
at current location 1871

Aug 10th 1807
Rev. Jediah Chapman forms First Presbyterian Church of Junius. 17 people become charter members. Services held in Col. Daniel Sayre's barn located on the Lake Rd.

1817
Col. Wilhelmus Mynderse donated land of current site and new church built. September 4th 1817 building is dedicated and first service held on existing site.

1842
Second building erected on current site. Brick building, federal style replaces wooden building. Wooden church building moved to State St. Current building of Sammy's Barber Shop.

1898
New organ installed at the cost of \$3500.

1923
During the 75th anniversary celebration of the first Women's Rights Convention in Seneca Falls, the National Women's Party drew up the first equal rights amendment, the proclamation of which by Alice Paul, the party's vice president, occurred in this church.

1958
The present organ is installed at a cost of \$32,000. The Schantz organ is comprised of 1200 pipes of which 305 are not under expression.



August 24, 1808
Rev. John Stuart was chosen first pastor and installed in Sayre's barn

1829
Legislature create four townships out of Junius: Seneca Falls, Waterloo, Tyre, Junius. Church re-named First Presbyterian Church of Seneca Falls

1871
Congregation decides to build new church building. Building is completed in 1873. Building is the existing church building today.

1907
Manse on State Street completed.

April 1946
The "barn" aka Eastman Hall was purchased as a youth recreation unit.

1961
Discussions begin to build Presbyterian college in Seneca Falls later to be called Eisenhower College. 1965 church donates \$100,000 towards college. November 5, 1967 first cornerstone laid. September 1, 1968 first class held. Eisenhower College closes in 1982 and re-opens as New York Chiropractic College in 1991.
